The Art for Peace Foundation is an independent, non-commercial organization operating on a non-profit basis.

2. Mission and Vision

Mission

The mission of the Art for Peace Foundation is to promote connection between people and cultures through art, dance, and creative expression. The foundation creates spaces in which encounter, personal development, and mutual understanding are central.

Vision

The foundation believes that art forms a universal language that transcends borders. Through shared creative experiences, people can reconnect with themselves, with others, and with their environment. In this way, art contributes to social cohesion, inclusion, and a peaceful society.

3. Objective

The objective of the foundation is to promote connection, peace, intercultural understanding, and social participation through artistic, dance, and educational projects.

The foundation focuses in particular on:

- young people and young adults;
- intercultural communities;
- people with migrant or refugee backgrounds;
- educational and social institutions.

The foundation exclusively serves the public benefit.

4. Activities and Operations

In order to achieve its objectives, the Art for Peace Foundation organizes, among others:

- community dance and music projects;
- international youth exchange programs;
- training courses and educational trajectories;
- workshops focused on personal and social development;
- intercultural art projects;
- collaborations with educational, cultural, and social organizations.

Example Project

Dreamcatcher Project

An international music and dance initiative in which young people are encouraged—through live encounters and online collaboration—to develop their creativity, experience cultural exchange, and build connections across national borders.

All activities are aimed at social impact and are not profit-driven.

5. Target Groups

The foundation focuses on:

- young people and young adults;
 - participants from socially vulnerable situations;
 - intercultural and international communities;
 - artists, teachers, and facilitators;
 - educational and social organizations.

6. Organization and Governance

The board of the Art for Peace Foundation consists of at least three members:

- Chairperson: Nanni Kloke
- Secretary: Lotte Groeneboom
- Treasurer: Charles v.d. Heijde
- Board Members: Carine Schuurmans – Gemma v.d. Mee

The board is responsible for policy, financial management, and supervision of the foundation's activities.

Board members perform their duties on a voluntary basis.

7. Remuneration Policy

Board members receive no remuneration for their activities. They are only entitled to reimbursement of actual expenses reasonably incurred in the performance of their duties.

Professionals involved in projects may receive appropriate compensation proportional to the nature and scope of their work and consistent with the foundation's objectives.

The foundation operates on a non-profit basis. Any positive financial results are fully reinvested in achieving the foundation's objectives.

8. Financial Policy

Income

The foundation acquires its financial resources through:

- government and fund subsidies;
- donations and gifts;
- sponsorship;
- project grants;
- partnerships and collaborations;
- participant contributions for training and educational activities.

Asset Management

The foundation's assets are managed carefully and are used exclusively to realize its objectives.

The foundation does not maintain assets beyond what is reasonably necessary to ensure continuity of its activities.

9. Allocation of Resources

Financial resources are allocated to:

- development and implementation of projects;
- educational programs;
- international cooperation;
- organizational costs;
- communication and public outreach.

At least 90% of the resources are spent on activities serving the public benefit.

10. Communication and Transparency

Through its website, the Art for Peace Foundation publishes:

- its objectives and policy plan;
- board composition;
- remuneration policy;

- activity reports;
- financial accountability.

By doing so, the foundation complies with ANBI public disclosure requirements.

11. Future Vision (2025–2028)

The foundation aims to:

- expand international youth projects;
 - strengthen intercultural collaboration;
 - develop sustainable partnerships with educational and social organizations;
 - further develop art as a tool for peace and social connection;
 - increase societal impact through projects such as **Dreamcatcher** and **Dance 2 Connect**.
